

The Advocacy Behind Badger Box

- Fresh, Wisconsin-sourced food from small and medium-sized farms, ranchers, co-ops, and more from over 40 providers
- 227,284 total Badger Boxes distributed across 61 counties
 from March 2022 through September 2023
- Over \$16 million spent on direct hunger relief for Federation members








PRELIMINARY DRAFT - NOT READY FOR INTRODUCTION

AN ACT to create 20.115 (3) (ad) and 93.485 of the statutes; relating to: grants

for assembling and distributing Badger State Boxes to food pantries and making an appropriation.

Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

This bill requires the Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection to make grants to a single nonprofit organization that operates as a federation of hunger relief organizations. The grant recipient must purchase food products that have been grown or produced in this state for the purpose of assembling Badger State Boxes (boxes made up solely of Wisconsin food products) and distributing them to food pantries throughout the state. The food included in a Badger State Box must be grown or produced by an individual who is a resident of this state or by a small- or medium-sized farm or business that is domiciled in this state. A "small- or medium-sized farm or business is defined in the bill as a farm or business with no more than 125 employees, not including any cooperative members if the farm or business is a cooperative.

Under the bill, a grant recipient may not charge a fee to a food pantry in exchange for receiving Badger State Boxes and may not distribute Badger State Boxes to any food pantry that charges a fee to any recipient of a Badger State Box. Grant funds may be used only for purchasing food and assembling and transporting Badger State Boxes for distribution and may not be used for other purposes, such as grant administration or food storage.

20.115 (3) (ad) Badger State Box grants. Biennially, the amounts in the schedule for Badger State Box grants under s. 93.485.

Section 3. 93.485 of the statutes is created to read:

93.485 Badger State Box grants. (1) In this section:

- (a) "Badger State Box" means a box that is made up solely of food products grown or produced by an individual who is a resident of this state or by a small- or medium-sized farm or business that is domiciled in this state; and that is intended for distribution to qualified food pantries.
- (b) "Qualified food pantry" means a nonprofit organization that distributes food to low-income individuals to alleviate hunger.


- (c) "Small- or medium-sized farm or business" means a farm or business that has no more than 125 employees, not including any cooperative members if the farm or business is a cooperative.
- (2) The department shall award grants from the appropriation under s. 20.115
 (3) (ad) for the purpose of organizing and expediting the assembly and distribution of Badger State Boxes. Grants shall be made to a single nonprofit organization that operates as a federation of hunger relief organizations and that has operated a program of comparable size to distribute Badger State Boxes for at least one year before receiving a grant under this section.
- (3) An organization that receives a grant under this section shall purchase food products grown or produced in this state by an individual or a small- or medium-sized farm or business for the purpose of assembling Badger State Boxes and shall distribute assembled Badger State Boxes to qualified food pantries throughout this state. A grant received under this section may be used only for purchasing food products and assembling and transporting Badger State Boxes for distribution, and may not be used for other purposes, including grant administration and food storage.
- (4) An organization that receives a grant under this section may not charge a fee to a qualified food pantry in exchange for receiving Badger State Boxes under this section and may not distribute Badger State Boxes to a qualified food pantry that charges a fee to a recipient of a Badger State Box.

Section 4. Effective date.

 $(1) \ \ This act takes effect on the day after publication, or on the 2nd day after publication of the 2023 biennial budget act, whichever is later.$

THE FARM BILL

The Farm Bill is a comprehensive piece of legislation passed by the United States Congress roughly every five years and most recently in 2018. It covers various aspects of agriculture, nutrition, conservation and rural development policies in the United States. It authorizes funding for various federal nutrition programs such as the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP/FoodShare in Wisconsin), the Emergency Food Assistance Program (TEFAP) and Commodity Supplemental Food Program (CSFP/Stockbox in Wisconsin).

PRIORITIES

As a leading anti-hunger public policy organization, Hunger Task Force encourages Congress to pass a Farm Bill in 2024 that increases funding for vital federal nutrition programs and expands access to nutritious food for low-income people, families and seniors. Hunger Task Force supports the following 2024 Farm Bill priorities:

NUTRITION PROGRAMS

Justice, Equity, Compassion and Stewardship. Hunger Task Force feeds people today by providing healthy and culturally appropriate food to hungry children, families and seniors in the community absolutely free of charge. Hunger Task Force also works to end future hunger by advocating for strong public policies and nutrition programs at the local, state and federal level.

TEFAP

PRIORITIES

- Reauthorize TEFAP and increase to \$200 million annually for discretionary funding for storage and distribution, Increase mandatory funding for TEFAP food purchases to \$500 million annually.
- Authorize up to \$20 million to be appropriated for TEFAP infrastructure grants.
- · Extend the Farm to Food Bank Projects and provide \$8 million in annual mandatory funding while eliminating the required 50%

CSFP/STOCKBOX IN WISCONSIN

- · Fund CSFP at a rate of \$325 million annually and guarantee a national caseload allocation of at least 760,000 participants.
- · Exempt Medicare payments from the gross income calculation to determine CSFP eligibility.

SNAP/FOODSHARE IN WISCONSIN

- · Permanently allow college students enrolled half-time or more to get SNAP benefits and eliminate the 80-hour work requirement.
- · Streamline the process for college students so no SNAP application is needed if a FAFSA form is submitted.
- End the prohibition on the use of SNAP benefits to purchase hot prepared foods from food retailers.
- Update the Thrifty Food Plan without being cost neutral during mandated adjustment periods
- · Provide support for funding and technical support for farmers to facilitate online SNAP sales.
- Eliminate the prohibition on individuals with drug felony convictions from participating in SNAP.
- · Require states to review EBT contracts to reflect the most up-to-date security standards.
- Reevaluate the three-month time limit on SNAP eligibility for working-age individuals who do not secure employment within that
- Reevaluate the five-year waiting period for immigrants to attain SNAP eligibility.

GENERAL/OTHER NUTRITION PROGRAMS

- · Oppose moving dollars from the Nutrition Title to any other Title.
- \cdot Amend Section 32 to enable the USDA to issue direct grants to food banks for the purpose of making commodity purchases from
- Support block grant programs that would enable food banks to purchase specialty crops directly from farmers.
- Support Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR).
